




The evolution of the site

Early mapping, and an aerial view




1893 Bartholomew Map,

below 'The Caldron'





Early days

Three extra courts! – Then WAR



Bethia and Paul Harding-Edgar were key members of the club from the 1930's to the 1960's



February 1937 – squash balls were one shilling and six pence each



1937 - The Club was so successful in its first year that three extra courts were commissioned immediately – Courts 4, 5 and the doubles – and a grand opening!

But then WW2 intervened: the Club was requisitioned by the War Office

The 1968 50th Anniversary history recalled ...

"In 1939 the Club premises were requisitioned by the Army but to this day we do not know exactly to what purpose, since the records are "TOP SECRET" and have never been released. When the courts came back Into civilian hands the main evidence of occupation was fire damage to the floor of Court 5. Heated courts have obviously been a high priority for longer than we think!

The re-opening of the Club after the war was due in large part to Gerry Barnes who returned as the professional, swapping his Royal Marine uniform and rifle for shorts and a squash racket. In July 1945, he wrote to members informing them that play would begin in September. "Rackets and balls could have been a problem but some have been obtained for hire," he wrote, "but hot showers maybe difficult to supply!" He himself promised to continue giving lessons, becoming more available "As I get fit again"; revealing that he, like so many returning members, had been wounded in the War.



The Club's principal personalities – one manager (Hadyn Davies), one Welshman and seven famous squash players





















Developments through the Ages

1968 – Lounge, dining and reception




2014-2022 Padel development



The Club's development has largely been gradual and functional rather than sudden and controversial, at least partly due to the somewhat constrained nature of the site. The first three courts in 1936 were quickly augmented by a further three, social space was more than doubled in 1968 (along with two extra glass-backed courts), the 1990's saw the addition of a fitness room, and Padel has dominated development in the 2010's and 2020's. Proposed developments which didn't happen included a swimming pool (twice – in the 1980's and 1990's), indoor tennis in the 1990's, a newbuild and blocks of flats in the 2000's and Real Tennis in 2010.

Interior changes through the Ages

The first major change to the Club's interior was the addition of the four extra courts in 1937, including Court 5 with its extensive viewing capacity. Images of court 5 below show the Duke of Edinburgh visiting in 1960, and the 2020 ESC Open on the same court, with winners former World #1 Karim Abdel Gawad, and Donna Lobban.





The first bar to be constructed was a quarter-circular affair in the corner of what was then described as the 'Committee Room in 1957. This was upgraded to the bar as we know it today, which was created in 1970. The lounge is adaptable as is shown below.









New Developments

2014-2022 Padel comes to ESC

In 2014, ESC became the first facility in Scotland to install a padel court, and has led the charge ever since. Funded principally from our own reserves, but with assistance from the Lawn Tennis Association, this facility has proven to be key to the club's success going forward, with regular 100% daily court occupancy

Future Developments

Our Crystal ball doesn't enable us to see all our directions of travel, but we will aim to keep the Club at the forefront of racket sport development. National Padel leagues for Men and Ladies were announced early in 2025, and Club intends to take part in those events





The Future?

We look into the crystal ball

You can be sure that the club, led by the board (which is appointed by the members), will aim to keep the business financially solvent in member ownership, and at the forefront of rackets development.

We may not be able to envisage the expanding Edinburgh tram network making its way past the Club as the Water of Leith branch line but we will continue to offer the best possible experience to our members and visitors. We regularly host private parties, one example of which is the BBQ shown at the foot of this page. As we approach our 90th anniversary in 2026, *Gemma Celata* (our hidden gem), will, we believe, continue to be one of Edinburgh's best kept secrets for many years to come.
