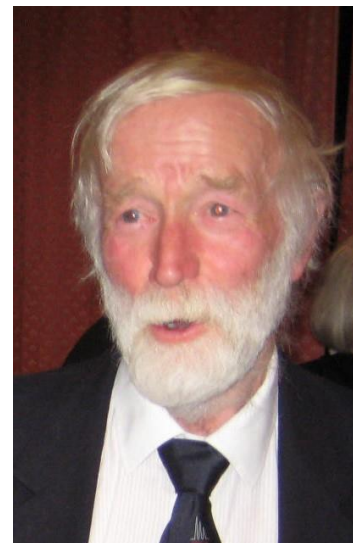


John Done biography

Born 8th June 1942, died 1st April 2026, aged 83

John had two siblings, his brother Alan, and his sister, Anne, five years John's elder, who died in February 2026. His father had a senior banking position, (and was a lay Methodist minister at the Upholland Chapel): his mother was a part-time French teacher. A little-known fact about John's cultural background is that he had a piano grade qualification, and played the organ in Upholland Parish Church, and occasionally at his father's chapel when required

John attended Upholland Grammar School, Wigan followed by Kings College London, where he took a BSC degree in Chemistry. During those undergraduate years (the early 1960's), he learned to play squash in the Grafton Club in South London. He followed that up with a PhD in a subject which is best described as 'related to Grignard's Reactions'. Victor Grignard shared the Nobel Prize for Chemistry in 1912, so the subject was evidently of importance (if you would like more information, check with Google). During work for his PhD, he developed extensive experience with the analysis of organic compounds. John worked with Bob Hider in the same laboratory, but on different projects. During that time, both John and Bob developed a strong interest in ornithology. Bob went on holiday with John in the Lake District in 1964, and it was during that time that they both became interested in bird watching and hill walking.



In Easter 1965 they went climbing in Glencoe, climbing around twenty Munros in a week. This led to a regular Easter party from Kings College, which ran for over 40 years. Pete Flowerday and Mike Moore joined some ten years later, an event initially involving camping, then cottages followed by larger houses as the complement grew. The Hibbert's became involved later.

John became a 'Munroist' by his 40th birthday, but continued mentoring many other hill walkers by continuing to climb well into his 70's.

John met Lorna at the Grafton, and married her 1966, with Bob as best man (an honour which he reciprocated). Lorna came to Edinburgh with John, and they stayed in a number of houses in Edinburgh (one a cottage near Ninemileburn) and further afield.

John joined ESC around 1969, and as can be seen from his list of Squash honours later, evidently made a big impression.

While working at BP in Sunbury, he got a two-year research assignment to Edinburgh University (Kings Buildings) under Professor Knox. The Knox laboratory led the world in utilising a new analytical technique (HPLC) High Pressure Liquid Chromatography. John was hired by Knox because of his experience in analysing oil for BP. When that finished, BP were expecting him back, but he decided to stay in Edinburgh, a secured a further three-year grant for another research project at KB. He later worked at DCL, who were looking at trying to develop quality control on whisky blending, then at 'Menstrie Analytics (now described as Diageo's Global Technical Centre) testing whisky (someone has to do it). In Edinburgh Sports Club, for several years John ran the computer side of the membership system, utilising complex computer software including Microsoft Access database.

One feels that his highly skilled chemistry background, and potentially his career prospects were at least partially eclipsed by a love of the Scottish hills, squash and bird-watching

In recent years, John's partner has been Yvonne Dalziel (sometimes referred to by George Preston as 'Yvonne con Done').

John died on 1st April 2026 after a long illness, the last four years being in Murrayfield Care Home in Edinburgh, visited regularly by his friends. He had celebrated his 80th birthday in May 2022 at the Edinburgh Sports Club.

MEMBER PROFILE Dr John Done

John Done started playing squash in 1963 while a student in London. A Lancashire lad from St Helen's young John took up a position at Edinburgh University after graduating with a PhD in Chemistry. This move launched a career playing for the ESC and his adopted country that is still active today. He has represented Scotland at every level and has an impressive playing resume.

Tournament Achievements

During the 1970s John took some famous scalps including the highly rated New Zealand International Trevor Colyer and England's Clive Francis. John has represented the Edinburgh Sports Club in National and Local leagues for nearly 26 years, Winning the Club Championships 4 times. He was the Semi-Finalist in the 1993 World Masters winning the player of the tournament award.

Outside playing John has been the Manager of the Scottish Senior Team (81/83) and is currently Manager of the Scottish Vets Team. Hobbies include Birdwatching and Hill Walking having climbed all 277 Munros by his 40th Birthday.

John's talent and attitude on and off court make him an ideal role model for any aspiring Junior member.

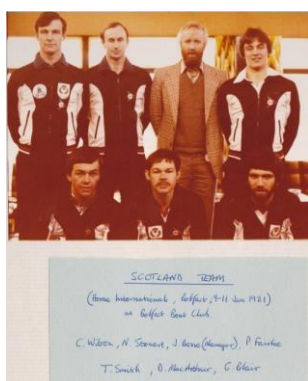

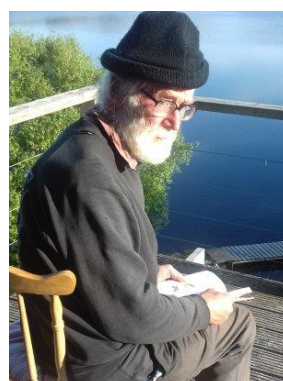
